AN ESSENTIAL ASPECT OF THE LAY VOCATION

This Gospel Passage is from St. Luke, chapter 10. That is a little strange as Luke had already recorded the sending of a previous group on the same mission. It is not normal to repeat identical stories in the Sunday readings. The first group consisted of the Twelve Apostles (chapter 9); the second of the Seventy Disciples (chapter 10). It is worth noting that there is no difference between the two accounts. This makes it important to investigate and see why Luke deliberately repeated this action of Jesus.

The Apostles will not be ordained priests until the Last Supper so they were still lay men when sent by Jesus. There is no indication that the Seventy ever were ordained. Luke's double account is to emphasise that his message is for the laity. These are his important missionaries bringing his message of salvation to the world.

The question immediately springs to mind: why did Jesus emphasise that the mission of the laity is spreading his message of salvation. Before ascending into heaven Jesus stressed to the bishops and clergy that their duty was also to be missionaries. For Jesus, to be a Christian is essentially to be a missionary. This does not mean that everyone has to leave home and travel overseas with his message.

Jesus informs the laity that the first duty is to "pray the Lord of the harvest to send missionaries into his harvest" (Gospel v.2). "The harvest is plentiful, but the labourers are few" (v. 3).



Many who should be active missionaries are neglecting their duty in the family which makes it the Number One problem in the Church.

Jesus adds a most special message for missionaries. Their goal is not success (he was not a success) but that their names are written in heaven by doing what God wants. The best way to do this is to pray full of love for the salvation of the world as if everything depended on God and then to act with your whole heart as if everything depended on you. Isn't it wonderful, and so consoling, to know what God wants from you and then get down to fulfilling his will?
